Lt. Col. Arthur Clyde Mussman, USAF (Ret.) 1932-2018

Arthur Clyde Mussman, born in Cincinnati Ohio on March 18, 1932

to Walter Blaine and Evelyn Clyde (Stanforth) Mussman. His Dad served in the Army Air Corps during WWII and died in the service of his country. He gradu-

ated from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1954, and entered the US Air Force as a Lieutenant.

While stationed in Darmstadt, Germany, he met Mary Ellen Yost who was teaching in the Darmstadt American School. They married on 1 February 1958 in the Darmstadt Post Chapel.

In 1979, Art and Mary retired from Air Force life and settled in Renton, where Art began a second career as a system analyst with Boeing. He had a severe stroke in 1990 and took a disability retirement from Boeing in 1992, moved to Kirkland and dedicated themselves to family and volunteer work. In 2017, he was honored with the state of Washington AARP Andrus Award for community involvement.

Art passed away on December 13, 2018 from pneumonia. He is survived by his daughter Anne Vitolo, his son Michael, and two half-sisters, Susan Stanforth of Rockford, IL, and Betsy (Rick) Gausling of Cincinnati.

A memorial celebration will be held January 21, 2019 at 10am at St Jude Catholic Church, 10526 166th Ave. NE, Redmond WA. Interment will be at Tahoma National Cemetery.

Plus many thanks to Eleanor Skinner for her dedication at the sign-in desk and food bank collections. And, thanks to Tom Moberg's help as the VFW facility coordinator.

The speaker this month was our own Millard Battles sharing his and Martha's trip to Southern Africa. With the help of a power point presentation, Millard's son, Bud and his fiancé Juliet Onero, gave us a very interesting presentation of Kenya But first, Bud shared exciting news. He proposed recently to Juliet at the top of the Space Needle. Congratulations!

Bud met Juliet four years ago while his wife, Jan, was battling cancer. Before Jan died, she requested that monies raised go to build a well and kitchen for the St. Michael's Girls Secondary School where Juliet was associated. Over \$10,000 was raised for these projects.

The Kenya custom is for prospective "in laws" families to visit each other and get to know their customs and life styles. That is when Millard and wife, Martha, were invited to visit Juliet, her two brother's families. Bud and Juliet organized and conducted an extensive visit from the coastal town of Mombasa on the Indian Ocean where Juliet lives, to Nairobi, the capital, where Juliet's brothers live, and to Kisumu on Lake Victoria where her parents live. Millard and Martha stayed with one brother, Francis, his wife Immaculate and their two children, Tony and Joyce, while in Nairobi and several days visiting with her parents in Kisumu.

Bud had some slides from his last two trips which entertained and informed us of the various animals and birds they saw while spending three days at Salt Lick Game Lodge in the Taita Hills. It was amazing how close they were able to get to these wild animals and not frighten them.

Juliet shared some of the details of Kenya customs and life style and answered questions from the audience. She "played" a musical instrument which is used for their tribal dances. Plus, they had brought some carved

We enjoyed the stories and information about Kenya and were all thrilled with the happiness displayed by Bud and Juliet about their engagement.










