Barbara Bell did the tops and **I** assembled the top, batting and backing and then tied.



Snohomish Conservation District Native Plant Sale

The Snohomish Conservation District—a new community partner with RSVP has a project they need help with. If you like gardening and plants and getting some exercise, this is for you. It'll soon be time for their annual District Plant Sale. It takes place at the Monroe Fairgrounds on Saturday, February 28th, starting at 8:00 AM.

Plant Sale Background: Each year hundreds of volunteer hours are clocked to help make this event one of the most successful native plant sales in our area. The Native Plant Sale is a one-day event that sells affordable, high-quality, native plants to help promote their use on private lands. Native plants benefit the environment because they are adapted to our climate, and provide vital habitat to native species of animals. They don't need excessive water during the dry summer months to survive, and they do well during the wet winters. They are adapted to many of the native soil types in our area, and generally flourish without hassle and extra inputs (such as fertilizer or constant watering.) They also protect our landscape from invasive species that create monocultures and unsightly brambles. Each plant we sell equals another opportunity to restore and protect our precious soil and water resources and salmon, pollinators and other wildlife.

Overview: Volunteer to help bundle and sort plants in preparation of our 30th anniversary Native Plant Sale. For every 4 hour shift worked, volunteers will receive specialty native plants, not for sale, and exclusively available to volunteers. There are two volunteer shifts to choose from: 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM and 12:30 PM to 4:30 PM.

During the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday (2/23, 2/24, 2/25) preceding the Saturday Plant Sale, our staff are busy unloading deliveries of native plants, packaging them into bundles, and helping to bag and tag them. There are thousands of plants to sort, bundle and tag. While volunteering, you can expect to be standing at a table, handling, bundling, tagging and moving plants. The room at the Fairgrounds is unheated and, depending on the weather, it can get chilly. We recommend wearing warm layers and comfortable shoes. If you have your own gardening gloves, please bring them. If not, no worries! We have plenty of extra gloves available to you. There will be training on site, so no special experience is necessary. We will provide light refreshments and snacks. If you need to sit or would like light duties please let me know and we can make sure to have you doing a task with sitting and no lifting.

Volunteer Opportunities—Current/Ongoing

SCIENCE RESOURCE CENTER – at Hawthorne School in North Everett. (North on Broadway, right turn on 12th, left at first stop sign and follow the road to the smaller parking lot at back of school.) Helpers are needed Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday from 8:30 am to 1:00 pm. You can work as few or as many as you want. This is usually a sit-down job of assembling science kits for the local schools.

ST. JOSEPH'S HOUSE – 1925 4th St. Marysville, Wa. Helpers are needed mainly on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Web site – www.saintjosephshouse.org. Job consists of sorting through donations, helping clients, clean up, stock shelves and whatever is needed. Clients shop here for free clothing and housewares.

PROJECT LINUS – sewing groups that meet at various locations throughout the area. Quilts are made

and donated to a variety of agencies and mainly for children up to age 18. A person can either sew a complete quilt or do partial project, for example – cutting blocks, assembling blocks for a quilt, sewing just the blocks, quilt tying, etc. You can do your part at home or in a group setting. I mainly sew the blocks at home and at group settings I tie quilts. The group setting that I attend is at Carl Gipson Senior Center in Everett. Men also participate.

SEW N SEWS -- part of Sno-King Bluebills. This is open to those who like to sew, knit or crochet. Quilts and other items such as hats, scarves and afghans are all donated to a variety of agencies in the local area for the low income and homeless.

"Jumpins." said Archie, "I'll have at call youse back."


Sure enough, Archie called again the next day. "President Obama! I'm sorry to have to tell you dat we have had to call off dis 'ere war."
