When A Loved One Dies: 29 Important Steps for Executor to Take-Adjusted for Retirees

1. WITHIN 24 HOURS, NOTIFY SOCIAL SECURITY 1-800-772-1213.

- 2. Notify immediate family and close friends.
- 3. Evaluate the emotional impact on the surviving spouse, children, close relatives and friends; arrange for support and care for any dependents.
- 4. Deal with donation of bodily organs to an organ bank according to decedent's wishes.
- 5. Arrange care for any pets.
- 6. Find perishable property (food, plants, etc.); arrange for care or disposal.
- 7. Arrange with post office to hold mail. Ditto for newspapers & home deliveries.
- 8. Evaluate need for security at decedent's residence.
- 9. Obtain certified death certificate and order more as needed.
- 10. Find and review decedent's express funeral and burial wishes (if any).
- 11. Prepare and arrange for publication of obituary if decedent wanted one.
- 12. Arrange for funeral/memorial/burial services according to decedent's wishes.
- 13. See if decedent is eligible for veterans' burial allowance.
- 14. Investigate to see if decedent is eligible for union burial benefits.
- 15. Keep records of all payments for funeral/memorial/other expenses.
- 16. Locate safety deposit box(es).
- 17. Locate wills, trusts, codicils, life insurance policies.
- 18. Locate other important documents, relationships, accounts, investment, etc.
- 19. Write to/speak with life insurance company(ies) about what to do with existing policy(ies). Any refunds possible?
- 20. Investigate Keogh and IRA accounts.
- 21. Investigate business, partnerships and investment arrangements.
- 22. Retain and meet with CPA or Enrolled Agent regarding tax and accounting matters.
- 23. Retain and meet with attorney regarding estate settlement.
- 24. Work with attorney (and tax person) to prepare inventory, list of accounts, and list of debts. Obtain valuation of assets as appropriate, as of date of death for use in future disposal.
- 25. Deal with fire, theft, liability, auto insurances on decedent's property(ies). Possible refunds?
- 26. Review credit and charge accounts and cancel as appropriate, making sure to keep one available for use until a new account can be opened for survivors.
- 27. Do not pay any of decedent's debts until attorney discusses them with family or executor of estate.
- 28. If trust is involved, executor will arrange for any allocations or transfers.
- 29. Arrange for final income tax return, inheritance and estate returns, if needed.
