#### **Chairman's Report**

Some exciting news from the Activity Center manager, Ron: he has suggested that our organization make presentations at the union meetings being held at a facility just beyond the Activity Center, for union members approaching retirement. Although we have our new brochure to hand out, I am also working with Stan Shipley to develop a Power Point presentation that will show our various members volunteering at many locations throughout the county. Stan also advised me that our Oly Pen chapter has developed a generic Power Point of Bluebills involved in a number of projects to support the needy, such as building wheelchair ramps and installing handrails, for example.

Our chapter refurbishes science and STEM kits for all of the students within the Everett School District. We are also currently emphasizing projects in support of the 100-year anniversary celebration of the Boeing Company, so retired employees should be prepared to share Boeing stories with the local media and with people at the Museum of Flight, located at the south end of Boeing Field. I encourage you to also involve your grandchildren in this celebration.

An endorsement of the Bluebills was recently sent to several SPEEA members and to Norma Vaughn by Bob Keever, Oly Pen, in which he describes the SPEEA retirement seminar he attended prior to his departure from the workforce. It was helpful in all ways except for suggestions describing what to do with all the spare time he had. He ended up connecting with the Bluebills and has enjoyed the experience so much that he was requesting that he and another Bluebill member be allowed to set up in the lobby prior to the next retirement seminar in order to hand out materials promoting Bluebills. He was hoping this would be a continuing activity occurring at future seminars. I hope to learn if this was effective in encouraging other retirees to consider membership in the Bluebills, thus increasing our numbers.
