It's that time of year—the election of new leaders, an annual event, unlike local, state and national elections. We are always looking for new leadership, and both Rose Johnson and Dave Skinner have decided they no longer wish to keep their positions, and I am hoping to step down as well, so I am requesting volunteers to step up and place their names in the upcoming election next month. I want to take this time to bring some important information regarding the consequences of hearing impairments in those of us who have reached the 'golden years.' My wife's hearing aid specialist agreed that I could provide some interesting results of studies on the hearing-impaired.

In one study, those individuals over 60 years of age who suffer hearing loss of greater than 25 decibels are at greater risk for developing dementia: more than 1/3 of the risk of dementia was associated with hearing loss. The risk of developing Alzheimer's disease specifically also increased with hearing loss, such that for every 10 decibels of hearing loss, the extra risk increased by 20%.

In another study, it was determined that untreated hearing loss can result in the brain 'forgetting' sounds, thus becoming unable to understand those sounds, It is important to remember the interpretation of sounds occurs in the brain not the ears.
