


Cash for Platinum, Silver and Gold

Meet Ted Muralt

Ted has been a Boeing Bluebill seemingly forever, since the inception of the Olympic Peninsula Chapter. Ted joined the Boeing Company in 1957 as a draftsman working the B-52 program in instrumentation. From the B52 program, he went to work on the Minuteman Missile System as an engineering aide. In 1959 he traveled to Edwards AFB in the California desert for the first flights of the Missile system. He said, "That was quite a sight seeing this huge missile blast out of the hole

only to get pulled quickly back to ground."

After returning to Seattle from Edwards AFB, Ted worked at the Minuteman Seattle Test Facility (STP). At this time Boeing had a program that paid certain individuals to go to the University of Washington to get a degree in their related fields while still working at the company. As long as a person worked 30 hours a week, schooling was paid for and all company benefits retained. "I could work close to 40 hours a week depending on the school load," he told me. He moved up in the organization after getting his BSEE, each time getting a little more responsibility.

In 1990, Ted ended up working on the 777 Flight Test Program at the Everett plant. He moved from the south end of Seattle (Kent) where he had been working at Kent Aerospace complex. After the move to the Everett plant, he bought a house on Whidbey Island, got into boating and had a sailboat and a motorboat in his backyard waterway.

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After his family was all settled in on Whidbey, he took early retirement in 1992 at age 55, because the company had decided to relocate the 777 project he was working on into some vacant Aerospace building in Kent.

Ted and his wife bought the place he now lives in at Clallam Bay in 1980. It was an RV-mobile and tourist park, and he and his wife managed it. Many of his renters were timber and fishing personnel. But the "Clallam Bay" recession hit (1981) when the lumber industry pulled out and fishing was curtailed. He had tried to research both industries before he bought, but was told everything would go on as usual. Even though the town and business was hit hard, because of a rumor of a state prison that was slated to be built in Clallam (which it later was), he thought they would be OK. They were making a go of it until the Covid-19 virus struck. Once again, he is facing cancellations and a little business adjustment.

Ted built and maintains the Olympic Peninsula Chapter website. He is also the "go-to-guy" for the Clallam Bay and Neah Bay essential supplies program for those school systems. In the early days, he would drive his pick-up truck into Port Hadlock after the World Vision delivery and then gather up the necessary supplies and drive back up to Clallam Bay. But he found it was hard to arrange to be there at a certain time to do the pick-up. So since he owned some storage units in the Sequim area, he provided one of those to be used by the Bluebills. By having the essential supplies at this Sequim unit, people from Clallam Bay, Neah Bay, Forks and Queets can come and pick up what they need when they could make time for it. One particular advocate of the system was a Clallam Bay school teacher named Diana Leiza, who was so overjoyed to have all these supplies for her kids, that she would use the school system vehicles and/or her own vehicles to get the supplies. She is retired now, but still makes the run for supplies just using her own car.

Ted has also been a big help to the Builder's Program in Sequim, as they needed some temporary storage area for their tools. Charlie Johnson says: "Ted bent over backward to help us. He's always furnished us a unit for essential supplies." Although Ted suffered a stroke awhile back, he isn't letting anything get in his way of helping.

There's no way that the Olympic Peninsula Chapter of the Boeing Bluebills can reach out and help so many people in our geographic service area without the invaluable service provided by Ted Muralt. A Big Thank You, Ted!

Minor Repairs?

Our Bluebills Independent Living Program offers ramps, grab bars, railings, transfer poles, and minor repairs relating to safety and ease of living. Oftentimes the latter includes repairs to outdoor steps and porches allowing for safe entry/exit into the house.

We responded to a request for repairs to a porch attached to a mobile home in Bremerton. Our site survey revealed that the front entry steps and porch were weathered, but structurally sound. Although we had made an appointment, no one came to the door, but then a window opened and an unfriendly voice wanted to know what we were doing there. "Bluebills," we announced with some authority, "we're here to see about the porch repair," upon which the unseen voice instructed that it was over on the side of the house.

We went around to the side of the house, and there was no porch or deck to be seen. But further probing underneath the blackberry brambles revealed rotted remains of what might have been a structure of some sort once upon a time.



Given that we were receiving almost one request for help every day at the time, and considering that this was not a primary entrance into the house, and the overall hopelessness of the situation, we decided to leave and press on to our next appointment.

The next stop was also reported to be a porch repair, and it was a much nicer neighborhood and house. We found the entry stairs, railing, and porch to be in good repair, of no safety concern, and quite nice looking. The client then pointed to a balcony attached to a second floor bedroom. The underpinnings were sound, although there were some worn out deck boards.

When we explained that we were averse to working in high places, and that this was more of a cosmetic, rather than a safety concern, the client pleaded that she was putting the house up for sale and she wouldn't get top dollar for it with the deck looking like this. Again, we had to pass on the job.

There have been other instances where the entry into a home involved unsafe passage due to bad steps, porches, or handrails that were rotted or missing. Sometimes the referral comes from EMS responders who report the unsafe conditions. We have responded to and made repairs at many of these homes. But sometimes we just have to say no.

Ramping Up

Kitsap Builders are gearing up to begin installing ramps again. Michael Crovitz and John White recently got a jump on things by pre-building a dozen of our standard 4x8 ramp modules. These pre-fabricated sections are transported to job locations where they're bolted to posts using angle brackets and structural screws. They can also be taken apart and removed/relocated when a client moves or no longer needs the ramp.


Builders Status
