



Here is a bit of helpful information about offset hinges which increase door clearance.

It is not unusual to find the bathroom door removed in a home where a wheelchair is used. Sometimes the door thickness is just enough to prevent access.

An alternative to removing the door is to replace the existing hinges with offset hinges. This hinge design effectively moves the door thickness behind the jamb.


