

EDUCATION

In 2018, working with PSO and the Museum of Flight, we were able to hold about 10 training sessions or programs that reached 1,492 students in Jefferson Co. Plans for 2019 are more of the same. Helping PSO with fund raising will be our main activity.

Bluebills have committed to participate in the Tri-Area feeding program in Chimacum. Volunteers will be needed so look for details in upcoming Flyers.

WORLD VISION ESSENTIAL SUPPLIES PROGRAM

Our partnership with World Vision is one of our biggest and longest running programs. We have been picking up school supplies and products at the W/V warehouse in Seattle for over 15 years. Currently we pick up various products once a month and school supplies once or twice a year. We offer these goods to around 100 schools, churches, agencies and non-profits over a three county area.

It has become obvious that the people we serve in our three counties, Kitsap, Jefferson and Clallam, use all the product we pick up and even more than we are providing. Our goal is to respond to that need by providing more goods more frequently. Figuring how to do this presents a couple of problems:

- Warehouse space and cost.
- Growing our volunteer base to support the expansion.
- Finding the money to purchase more W/V memberships.

One idea that comes to mind is increasing our product turn-around time from 4 weeks to 3 weeks and using our existing warehouse and volunteers more efficiently plus expanding that group. We would also keep our Essential Supply Memberships the same (10) as that is about the max we can handle in our warehouse.

World Vision has agreed to support a 21 day pick-up cycle at their Fife warehouse. Currently, we will deliver to Kitsap Co. on March 8. The last regular pickup will be on March 12 for Clallam Co. The pick for Clallam will be on March 29, delivery to Clallam on April 1. We then start our 21 day cycle with a pick up at World Vision on April 2 for Jefferson Co. The schedule is shown on the following page.

World Vision 21 Day Pick Up Cycle

Below is the schedule for a 21 day pick up cycle. Wed and Thurs are Port Ludlow golf days so are not used. There is a cushion on all dates except the pick up date at World Vision. The pick is always scheduled for a Friday so could go into the weekend if needed. Delivery is always scheduled on the Monday before the next pickup at World Vision. Delivery could be done on the morning of the W/V pickup, if needed. I have tried to maximize the time for the County Coordinators to work with their groups and build the pick sheets.

This schedule gives us:

- 12 pick ups vs our normal 8 for the above period.
- A 50% increase in the goods we provide at no additional cost for another warehouse or increasing our membership number.
- On a yearly basis we pick up 16 times vs 11.

We will be needing some extra help to make this work.

- Picking up at World Vision in Fife. If you have a pickup, mini-van, or SUV, think about driving once or twice a year. We usually need 3-4 vehicles for pickup.
- Helping at the Chimacum Warehouse: unloading, doing inventory, and helping put together the delivery loads ("the pick"). You will be working with 4 or 5 others.
- Computer work putting together the delivery loads. This is the job of the County Coordinators but occasionally they are not available and someone has to fill in. Do this from your home. If interested, we will train you.
- Delivering the goods to agencies. Each month items are delivered to 10-15 agencies in the county. Help can be used here.

If you are interested in helping with any of the above let me know and I'll see you are notified of the next opportunity.

Meet Your Fellow Bluebills

Jim Kowalczyk and his wife, Mary, have been involved in the World Vision deliveries in his hometown of Brinnon for the last 4 years, ever since Bill and Candy Antiss asked for their help. Their challenge in Brinnon has been finding a place to store the pallets of goods they picked up in Fife. Originally a family in Quilcene allowed the Brinnon Bluebills to utilize their outbuilding. This family suddenly needed the use of this outbuilding, so another person in Quilcene let them use part of a shed. Finally they found

space in a section of an old county building. So once a month he and three other Bluebills head to Fife for the pick-up, and then the following week, an additional 4-5 Bluebills meet to organize and deliver the goods.

Not long after he and Mary moved to the Brinnon area, they saw an email announcement that the local food bank needed a driver. Since then they've been making runs to Silverdale and Port Hadlock to pick up donated food. He told me that supporters of the Brinnon food bank drive more miles every year than any other food bank in the state.

Jim grew up in Allyn, attending elementary school in a two-room schoolhouse. After graduating from N. Mason high school, he went to WSU and received his degree in Police Science. He was a police officer for 30 years, working for several agencies during that time. He retired in 2008. Most of that time they lived in the Snohomish area. Prior to retirement, he and Mary started looking for property in the Puget Sound area and found some property at the top of a mountain in Brinnon 20 years ago.

They slowly started to develop it, camping on it at first until they were able to build their home.

Mary's father worked as a test pilot for Boeing for many years. She now helps out at the Windemere Real Estate office in Brinnon. She is a "prolific gardener," according to Jim. They both really get a great deal of satisfaction in their volunteer efforts while putting lots of miles on their vehicles! We are glad they are part of our organization.

Jim McGonigle and his son, Kevin, joined the Boeing Bluebills about a year ago. They had both been active in helping at Catholic Community Services and one day, Bob Keever came to one of their meetings and made his pitch about the great work that our chapter is doing. He knows that the people he and Kevin are helping are super appreciative of their efforts. "Some of those widows have real spunk!" he told me. "So self-sufficient."

After he married Louise, his wife of 44 years, he went back to school at the Montana College of Mining Science and Technology and got another degree in Engineering. Then he was recruited to the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton where he worked for 30 years. He retired in 2006 but soon found himself needing something to do, so he became a contractor with Booz Allen and returned to work at the Shipyard for another several years. He retired "for good" in 2015.

That's when he started volunteering in earnest, first with Catholic Community Services giving people rides to doctor appointments, etc. He loves to read non-fiction and does a little gardening. Kevin helps around the house and takes classes at Olympic Community College. He especially likes yoga. He and Louise have two other children, another son and a daughter.
