Last month for the Central Leadership Committee meeting, Myron Vogt gave me a few suggestions for items of interest that I may wish to discuss.

A couple were that World Vision has to cut back on the amount of supplies that they give us. Another was about a ramp we were to build in Olalla. Seems that the charity that referred the family to us had never asked for this help in the past. They have always used a commercial outfit for this type of work. Their budget had been reduced to the point that they could not fund such things. The third item was about the number of projects we have accomplished so far this year and a projection that we may have as much as a 30% increase over what we did last year.

I combined all of this into one subject that I presented. The point was that the economic slowdown has had a direct impact on what we do. The charities that we partner with are having a difficult time meeting all of their needs to support our common clients. World Vision is not receiving the amount of donations that they have received in the past, and more families who in the past may have contracted to have ramps and grab bars installed now need our help. All this makes the Bluebills more important to the welfare of the families in the counties that the Olympic Peninsula Chapter supports. It is probably a surprise to see how the economy directly affects us all.

This is truly a remarkable institution that we all work so hard to make successful as an integral part of the support our community cherishes.

Bluebills partner with Community Enrichment Alliance on a number of projects. This month it was helping them with a book sale. For the past several weeks CEA had been collecting books, tapes and CD's, and storing them in member's homes. Bluebills were asked to pick them up and take them to the Beach club where they were sorted and prepared for sale the next day. In total we picked up four pickup-loads of material. Following the sale the unsold books would go to Goodwill and the library in Port Hadlock.

The sale exceeded expectations. CEA made \$1500 on the program, which will go to a scholarship fund.

As we celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Apollo 11 flight, we recognize Docent Dick Cihak, a man who helped launch Apollo flights 8 thru 17 and Skylab I. As Lead Engineer in the Kennedy Space Center Ground Measuring Group, he monitored critical pre-launch data fed to the Launch Control Center through the booster's umbilical cables. The Ground Measuring Group's primary responsibility ended at liftoff when the umbilical cables were ejected.

His most memorable launch was Apollo 12, when the Saturn V/Apollo space vehicle was struck by lightning as it lifted off. Dick notes, "It was very tense on the ground, but the crew was amazingly calm as they reset systems and proceeded with the flight."

The Boeing Company moved Dick to Seattle to work on AWACS and other programs until his retirement in 1990. He has logged over 3,000 hours at The Museum of Flight during his 16 years as a Docent. Dick's involvement with the Museum dates to 1983, when he joined as a Charter Member. He now volunteers on Mondays and serves on the Docent Leadership Council, the Aloft editorial board, and on the Docent Training Committee, where he teaches Docents about the Museum's space exhibit. He particularly enjoys working special projects and events, including the Museum's annual Gala and with the Washington Aerospace Scholars (WAS) program, where he serves as a mentor to students whose project is to develop a human mission to Mars.

At the X-15 Gala in 2007, Dick escorted Einar Enevoldson, a research pilot who, with Steve Fossett, set a world's altitude record in a sailplane. For the 2009 Gala, which honored the flight of Apollo 11, greeted Apollo Astronaut William Anders, and enjoyed interesting conversations.

The space exhibit is Dick's favorite and he works it at every opportunity. One day a young man walked up and asked him about the myth that the moon landings never happened, that they were staged in Hollywood. Dick was the right guy to ask. He explained his launch role and meeting the

astronauts following their return to Earth. While Dick's efforts won't quash this long-standing myth completely, he was able to convince one skeptical visitor

- a good start!

For the past several years Bluebills have been collecting school supplies over the summer months so that we can deliver a significant amount of goods just prior to schools starting in the Fall. Dick Ostlund coordinates the effort which requires obtaining a warehouse (in this case a 12 foot by 40 storage unit), shelving for the unit (made by Bluebills with funds provided by

Ken Winter's son, who is a Boeing airplane salesman.) and sorting out the goods as they are received. The school supplies are provide by World Vision.

By the time of delivery there was no longer any room in the warehouse and the Gifts-In-Kind warehouse was used for overflow.

During the last week in August the items were delivered to the thirteen schools in our area who have more then 70% of the students on free or reduced price meals. The schools stretched from Queets, Neah Bay and Clallam Bay on the west and northwest coast to schools in Shelton, in the Hood Canal.

Our volunteers stepped up to the task of delivering about one pickup truck load of schools supplies to each of the schools. The Hood Canal volunteers took care of the schools in their area. Russ and Shelly Rousseau made the long trip to Queets, dropping off the Forks load in route. Ted Muralt of Clallam Bay arranged for their school district to make their pick up.

Amy and John Miller, Mike Graham and Larry Lang covered the remaining schools.


