#### 2009 SCHOOL SUPPLY FROM WORLD VISION FROM DICK OSTLUND



We will be delivering supplies to 11 grade and two high schools this year. They are:

 Mason County: Bordeaux Elementary, Evergreen Elementary, Hood Canal Elementary, Shelton Middle School

2. Jefferson County: Brinnon Schools

 Kitsap County: Naval Ave. Elementary, Renaissance High School, West Hills Elementary

 Clallam County: Clallam Bay School, Dry Creek Elementary, Forks Elementary, Neah Bay School, Queets Clearwater Elementary

All of the schools were selected by the County School Management based upon the World Vision criteria that at least 70 percent of the students must be on the free or reduced price lunch program. We receive school supplies from World Vision warehouse located in Fife once a month for four consecutive month June to September. We bring them with the GIK supplies and separate the school related stuff when the trucks arrive at our warehouses. Since , with a little luck and with the help of CEA and Mary Stuart, the SSD warehouse this year is much larger than what we had in the past. The past couple years we had a continuous inventory of all the SSD supplies that we updated each month. At the end of the season, we then, after receiving inputs from the schools, needed to create the stacks of boxes outside for each individual school. Not only were we exposed to weather, but after storing the stuff for four months, we had a warehouse full and the work of creating the thirteen separate stacks was intensive and required a lot of help.

This year, with the large warehouse, we have been able to separate each schools supplies as they were delivered. We held off doing any inventory until all of the first three months of supplies were received. AS we received the supplies, we would separate them for the eleven grade schools, one large stack for the two high schools, and separate pile for the grade school items that came in very large quantities in single or few boxes from World Vision. After the three months of receipts, we met a crew at the warehouse last week and finished the identification of the 13 stacks, and inventoried that available supplies. This took a larger group but only a couple hours. We were fortunate to have the following people willing to help.

Michael Graham, Ken Close, and Vicki Tallerico. While George and Joan Zimmerman initially volunteered, circumstances prevailed upon their plan and they sent, in their place, an astounding group of family and friends that collectively made the job not only quick, but a lot of fun. This group were:

We will provide individual inventory lists to each school on September 10th after receipt of one more load from World Vision on the 8th. All deliveries will occur between September 22 and the 25th.

### BRINNON AND QILCENE GIFTS-IN-KIND PROGRAM

Last month in the Flyer we announced the intention to expand the GIK program in Brinnon and Quilcene. The objective was to provide more GIK products to members in these areas. This was possible because Bluebills and community members of Brinnon and Quilcene were willing to make the trip to Fife, near Seattle, and pick up goods and the community was able to furnish a place to warehouse the items for distribution.

Their willingness to help themselves will make it possible for them to distribute about forty-eight pallets of goods each year to members of their communities instead of the current twelve pallets.

On August 27 a meeting was held in Brinnon to establish an organization to pick up, inventory and distribute the goods from World Vision. Twelve members of the communities attended. They were all there to help.


Because of our commitment to World Vision to maintain control of inventory and distribution there is a degree of paperwork and organization required. Members readily accepted responsibility for the tasks.

# PORT LUDLOW HOME PROJECT

A real estate group that we partner with, Real Estate Professionals for Affordable Housing (REPAH) asked if we would help out a woman with two teen-agers that lived in a small house in Port Ludlow.

There were a number of problems:

There was a leak in the roof over the kitchen which had run into the ceiling light fixture in addition to causing the ceiling to sag.

The family had removed the light fixture to avoid an electrical problem.

The septic tank needed a new cover.



The room completely primed and ready for the final wall finish.
Bluebill installed the small window in the background.

A framed-in porch used as a bedroom and study area had no insulation or wall covering. A window was desired to provide some ventilation

Normally we would not tackle this kind of job but the house was small and easy to work on plus being close to where most of us lived. REPAH agreed to fund the cost of material so we took it on.

The leaking area had already been "repaired" a couple of times to no avail so we decided to completely re-shingle the small problem area. The ceiling was repaired and a new light fixture installed. We made and installed a new cover for the septic tank. The porch was the biggest job. A A small window was installed then insulation in the ceiling and all the exterior walls. We covered the wall, installed trim and primed everything. HELPING WERE:
